CHARTING THE COURSE WITH PASTOR AARON

I love reading to my kids for many different reasons, including the fact that I almost always learn something new when reading to them. Children's books today are so educational and interesting. I was recently reading them a book called *Corn is Maize*, written by Aliko Brandenburg. The book is an illustrated children's book that tells the story of the history of corn. Unlike most plants, corn cannot grow wild. If an ear of corn falls to the ground, it will not grow any new healthy corn plants without human intervention. Did you know that? I certainly didn't! So... where did the first corn plant come from?

For a long time the answer to that question was a mystery until scientists found scraps of a plant in a cave in Mexico that were more than 5,000 years old. What they had found was an early "ancestor" of modern corn, whose kernels were each wrapped in their own husk or pod and loosely attached to their stalk. This "pod corn"—over a period of hundreds of years—was cross-pollinated by other grasses so that the ears of the plant began to grow stronger and larger. The indigenous people of the Americas discovered the plant, found that it was good for them, and continued to cultivate and improve it to make it more like the corn we know today.

What does any of this have to do with the church? Well, it's November, and corn is frequently a Fall-time decoration; corn mazes are a favorite activity after harvest time; and creamed corn, corn casserole, and cornbread are traditional menu items at family Thanksgiving dinners. But the connection is greater than that. Think of corn as a metaphor for the church. A lot of churches across America feel like early corn right now. Single kernels barely hanging on. Like corn, I think churches really need to be cross-pollinated in order to grow healthier and stronger. What does that mean literally? Well, cross-pollination happens across different plants, and, likewise, I think churches need to intentionally seek out relationships with different Christians. There are Spanish- and Korean-speaking churches in the Greater Rochester Area. There are historically African American churches in the city. There are churches around us who believe differently, worship differently, and prioritize differently than we do. Maybe one of the best things we can do right now is get to know those churches. It's beautiful to realize that difference can make us stronger.

As you are sitting down to Thanksgiving dinner this year, I encourage you think about corn and how our church can be cross-pollinated so that we can grow healthier and stronger.

EMAILING SAFELY



Staying Safe Using Email

Phishing is the fraudulent practice of sending emails purporting to be from a reputable person or organization in order to induce individuals to reveal personal information, such as passwords and credit card numbers. At FPC Pittsford, we want to be a place that people can trust to have their best interests at heart, but there are countless imposters who are more than happy to exploit that trust. Occasionally we get reports that members of the Presbytery have received emails soliciting information, monetary donations, or gift cards while impersonating the Presbytery Leader, Susan Orr. This has also happened at several local churches and synagogues across the country.

This is a common scam targeting religious groups throughout the nation, as reported by AARP in 2021, and there's little that we can do to prevent future occurrences, except provide you the tools to be vigilant.

From the above referenced AARP article:

"The deceit unfolds like this:

1. The bad actors hijack the identity of a religious leader or, say, an administrative staffer at a house of worship.
2. They text or email congregants with a sob story: A cancer patient is hurting for cash. A man was tossed out of work. A family's home has flooded after the pipes burst.
3. There's always an excuse as to why the religious leaders can't help at that moment. That they are unavailable is often the rationale for seeking outside help.
4. If, as instructed, the victim of the scam buys gift cards, the cards' serial numbers and PINs are handed over to the impostor through a call or digital photo.
5. The criminals disappear, leaving their victims reeling.

AARP's Amy Nofziger, who oversees its free, toll-free Fraud Watch Network Helpline (877-908-3360), says there's been an uptick in clergy scams during the pandemic as millions of people worship remotely. "We see and hear these horrible stories about people not having food on their table or seeing loved ones sick," she adds, "and our love for our community and church compels us to help." Nofziger says complaints about clergy scams used to trickle in to the Helpline once or twice monthly; since the global health crisis, there have been five or six reports weekly."

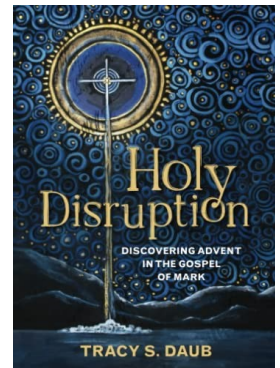


Advent Season Activities

This Advent's Children Devotional will be a book that will also be available on November 20.

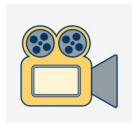
